# On purchasing a Bible to nurture the faith of a young person.

A little while ago a member of the Diocese reached out to the Ministry Development Committee for recommendations for a Bible suitable for a 10 year old as a gift to support their growing faith, a Bible that could be accessed as a young person but also age with them as they got older. The answer given is reproduced below:

It can be challenging to find the right edition for younger people. But what a gift to give!

There are a number of Children's Bibles for younger children, but for an edition that can grow with a teenager you would want to look for an NRSVA (or the latest version, the NRSVUE) or an NIV translation that are true to the text but accessible.

If cost is an issue then I would look at an NRSVA Children's Bible: <a href="https://koorong.com/product/nrsvue-children-s-bible-black-letter-edition-ages\_9781496472014">https://koorong.com/product/nrsvue-children-s-bible-black-letter-edition-ages\_9781496472014</a> It is the same translation that we use in the Anglican Church of Australia and has some engaging illustrations and costs \$25 from Koorong.

If the budget can be stretched then the Catholic Church has produced a really excellent edition in an NIV translation (which is the translation that when I was eleven, I found accessible) with a lot of background information and links in their Adventure Bible. There is a Kids version and an Adults "Great Adventure" version. has really engaging elements on the inside. In its favour, it doesn't say "Children's Bible" which is nice for a 10 year old who will see themselves as soon outgrowing that.

A beautiful option for use by families is The Book of Belonging: Bible Stories for Kind and Contemplative Kids by Mariko Clark illustrated by Rachel Eleanor, It is beautifully presented and can be read to very young children and read by all ages. https://

An amazing and dynamic graphic novel that outlines the Gospel of Mark through the miracles of Jesus by talented artist and storyteller John Hendrix is another option for readers of all ages 10 and up. # Celebrating 190 Years of Worship at St Stephen's

On The Feast of Christ the King, St Stephen's celebrated a remarkable milestone: 190 years of worship on our site. The day was filled with thanksgiving, music, and fellowship as we honoured our



rich heritage and looked ahead with hope.

The Ven Canon Rev'd Scott Lowrey, our Vicar General and Archdeacon of the South West, presided and preached for the occasion. In a moment of novelty and humour, Fr Scott delivered his sermon from our historic Henty Pulpit (see photo above) —something he found both amusing and unique, as he confessed he had never preached from the pulpit in his own church!

Music was a central feature of the celebration. The Portland City Band filled the church with vibrant sounds, while our specially formed choir led the congregation in spirited hymn singing. Michael Ashby, as our soloist, gave a moving performance, accompanied on the newly blessed piano by Bronwyn Russell. This piano, a generous gift from David Peddie's bequest, added a new dimension of beauty to our worship.

The service also included the commissioning of our newest Parish Councillor, David Mills, and the Eucharist, which brought us together in faith. To mark the occasion, four banksias were planted on the church grounds, symbolizing growth, resilience, and hope for future generations.



The celebrations continued with a delightful luncheon in the hall, where the spirit of fellowship was evident in the lively conversations and shared joy.
